## 2 Corinthians 2

Lesson 3

Hurting those he loved was definitely not Paul's goal. Rather, he desired joy for them. Paul's concern was that his precious letter had brought sorrow rather than joy to the believers in Corinth. Correcting or disciplining others should always be for the purpose of helping them, not punishing. It should be with the goal of seeing that they are sorry but not to make them sorrowful. True "sorrow" brings joy. And thus, was Paul's intention for those he ministered to in Corinth.

#### **DAY ONE: Read 2 Corinthians 2**

- 1. Read through this week's verses using both your Observation Worksheets and another Bible translation or paraphrase. After reading through these verses, what would you say to someone if they asked you what they were about?
  - a. Chapter 2 of 2 Corinthians has been divided into three paragraph divisions. List below the subject(s) covered in each section.

Verses 1-2

Verses 3-11

**Verses 12-17** 

How would you title each section? Record your titles on the **Chapter** & **Paragraph Division Titles Chart** provided with your Observation Worksheet. Now record a title for the second chapter of 2 Corinthians.

- 2. At the right-hand side of the same chart are columns labeled **Key Word** and **Symbol**. They have been provided for you to record the key words and the symbol you have chosen to represent each one. Record the key words listed below and their symbols on the chart.
  - God, Jesus, any personal pronouns that refer to Paul (such as I, myself or we), love and forgive/forgiven.
  - Now, using the symbols you have chosen, mark each of the key words each time they are used in 2 Corinthians 2. Remember, as you mark the key words to mark any personal pronouns that refer to them. You do not need to mark every word that refers to them only those that you feel are significant.
- 3. Only two verses in chapter 2 contain the word *love*. Yet, this key word reveals the heart behind Paul's intentions. Record what these verses tell us about Paul's intentions.

| D. | AT TWO: Read 2 Comminans 2:1-2   |
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| 1. | In chapter 2, Paul continued to explain his reasoning for not coming to see the believers in Corinth. He began with the words <i>But</i> , <i>I determined this within myself</i> . The New Living Translation puts it this way: <i>So</i> , <i>I said to myself</i> , " <i>No</i> , <i>I won't do it</i> ". What did Paul <i>determine</i> not to do? |
|    | a. Paul refers to his struggles in writing to them and in not coming to see them throughout this letter. Look up the following verses and summarize what he was saying:  |

|    | 1.) What does this say to you about Paul's attitude toward disciplining those he has authority over?   |

| 2. | Read 2 Corinthians 2:3. Although Paul had rebuked the Corinthians, although he called them <i>carnal</i> , although his writing to them reflected much frustration, he did not want to bring them sorrow. What did he desire for them?   |

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### DAY THREE: Read 2 Corinthians 2:3-8

- 1. Paul wrote his previous letter to the believers in Corinth having the hope that they would receive his correction so that when he did come to see them, he would not be saddened by their carnal behavior. The behavior of one believer, not only affects those who shepherd her, but it also affects other believers. What does 1 Corinthians 12:26 say about this?
  - a. In what way do you think the believers at Corinth could bring *joy* to Paul?
    - 1.) This *joy* desired by Paul, is valued by all sincere shepherds. What did John write in 3 John 1:4?
    - 2.) Why do you think it is important for overseers to let those they oversee know they are proud of them?
- 2. How painful it was to write that letter! Heartbroken, I cried over it. I didn't want to hurt you, but I wanted you to know how very much I love you. I am not overstating it when I say that the man who caused all the trouble hurt your entire church more than he hurt me (2 Corinthians 2:4,5 NLT). It is believed that Paul was referring to the man who was sleeping with his father's wife. See 1 Corinthians 5. Why might someone in the church who is living in sin, hurt the entire church?
- 3. Apparently, the church obeyed Paul by applying the discipline directed. Record the discipline called for in 1 Corinthians 5:5, 11-13.
  - a. What did Paul say about the *punishment* which the *majority* of them had *inflicted*? See 2 Corinthians 2:6.
    - 1.) Define the word *sufficient*.
- 4. According to verse 7, what might be the consequence of too much church discipline or *punishment*?
  - a. On the contrary, what were they to do? verses 7 and 8.
    - 1.) How might the members of a church *comfort* and *reaffirm their love* to someone who has repented from a sinful lifestyle?
