

# Women's Bible Studies

## Judges 3

Lesson 2

Israel has found itself in a cycle of sin. God would reveal their sin, they would despise what they were doing, cry out to the LORD for deliverance, find temporary relief but then slip back into sin again. Have you ever found yourself in that same place? The good news is that the cycle can be broken. We only need to learn warfare. For the weapons of our warfare are not carnal but mighty in God for pulling down strongholds (2 Corinthians 10:4). When we fight God's way, we win.

### **DAY ONE: Read Judges 3**

- 1. Read through this week's verses using both your Observation Worksheets (attached) and another Bible translation or paraphrase. After reading through these verses, what would you say to someone if they asked you what they were about?
- 2. A key phrase in Judges 3 is *evil in the sight of the LORD*. Record the verses where this phrase is used and note anything significant that you observed.
- 3. Note the key phrase *cried out* in verses 9 and 15. What was God's response to their cries?

#### **DAY TWO**

- 1. Judges 2 closed with God's statement, *I also will no longer drive out before them* (Israel) *any of the nations which Joshua left when he died, so that through them I may test Israel.* Judges 3 opens with the word *test* (verses 1,4). According to Judges 3:2, what was the purpose of the *tests*?
- 2. Warfare should not be something foreign to the Christian. 1 Peter 5:8 reminds us, *Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil walks about like a roaring lion, seeking whom he may devour.* In your own words, record what the following verses teach us about *warfare*.

	Review Judges 2:11-19 and list or summarize Israel's cycle of disobedience.
	a. How could this cycle have been broken?
2.	As we continue to look at the story of King Eglon and Ehud we see that, although all of Israel cried out to the Lord, one man did something. One man stepped forward and God enabled him. Many times we may feel overwhelmed by the enemy and feel like deliverance is just not possible. Read Romans 6:1-18 and record what you learn about the deliverance that God has provided for us through Jesus Christ. Note: This portion of Romans may seem difficult to understand. Record what you do understand, rather than allow yourself to be overwhelmed by what you do not understand.
	<b>Romans 6:1-7</b> Notes: the <i>old man</i> is all that you were; your self ruled your flesh. The <i>body of sin</i> is a reference to your body (flesh) as an instrument of sin. <i>Done away with</i> means rendered inoperative. According to these verses, what are we freed from and how?

	<b>Romans 6:8-11</b> What are we to consider ourselves <i>dead</i> to? Why? How?			
	<b>Romans 6:12-14</b> These verses begin with the word <i>therefore</i> . Rather than <i>present our members as instruments of unrighteousness</i> , what are we to do?			
	Romans 6:16-18 What is the way to be set free from any sin that would ensnare us?

### Judges, Chapter Three

1Now these *are* the nations which the LORD left, that He might test Israel by them, *that is,* all who had not known any of the wars in Canaan <sup>2</sup>(this was only so that the generations of the children of Israel might be taught to know war, at least those who had not formerly known it), <sup>3</sup>namely, five lords of the Philistines, all the Canaanites, the Sidonians, and the Hivites who dwelt in Mount Lebanon, from Mount Baal Hermon to the entrance of Hamath. <sup>4</sup>And they were *left, that He might* test Israel by them, to know whether they would obey the commandments of the LORD, which He had commanded their fathers by the hand of Moses. <sup>5</sup>Thus the children of Israel dwelt among the Canaanites, the Hittites, the Amorites, the Perizzites, the Hivites, and the Jebusites. <sup>6</sup>And they took their daughters to be their wives, and gave their daughters to their sons; and they served their gods. <sup>7</sup>So the children of Israel did evil in the sight of the LORD. They forgot the LORD their God, and served the Baals and Asherahs. 8Therefore the anger of the LORD was hot against Israel, and He sold them into the hand of Cushan-Rishathaim king of Mesopotamia; and the children of Israel served Cushan-Rishathaim eight years. <sup>9</sup>When the children of Israel cried out to the LORD, the LORD raised up a deliverer for the children of Israel, who delivered them: Othniel the son of Kenaz, Caleb's younger brother. <sup>10</sup>The Spirit of the LORD came upon him, and he judged Israel. He went out to war, and the LORD delivered Cushan-Rishathaim king of Mesopotamia into his hand; and his hand prevailed over Cushan-Rishathaim. <sup>11</sup>So the land had rest for forty years. Then Othniel the son of Kenaz died. <sup>12</sup>And the children of Israel again did evil in the sight of the LORD. So the LORD strengthened Eglon king of Moab against Israel, because they had done evil in the sight of the LORD. <sup>13</sup>Then he gathered to himself the people of Ammon and Amalek, went and defeated Israel, and took possession of the City of Palms. <sup>14</sup>So the children of Israel served Eglon king of Moab eighteen years. <sup>15</sup>But when the children of Israel cried out to the LORD, the LORD raised up a deliverer for them: Ehud the son of Gera, the Benjamite, a left-handed man. By him the children of Israel sent tribute to Eglon king of Moab. <sup>16</sup>Now Ehud made himself a dagger (it was double-edged and a cubit in length) and fastened it under his clothes on his right thigh. <sup>17</sup>So he brought the tribute to Eglon king of Moab. (Now Eglon was a very fat man.) <sup>18</sup>And when he had finished presenting the tribute, he sent away the people who had carried the tribute. <sup>19</sup>But he himself turned back from the stone images that were at Gilgal, and said, "I have a secret message for you, O king." He said, "Keep silence!" And all who attended him went out from him. <sup>20</sup>And Ehud came to him (now he was sitting upstairs in his cool private chamber). Then Ehud said, "I have a message from God for you." So he arose from his seat. <sup>21</sup>Then Ehud reached with his left hand, took the dagger from his right thigh, and thrust it into his belly. <sup>22</sup>Even the hilt went in after the blade, and the fat closed over the blade, for he did not draw the dagger out of his belly; and his entrails came out. <sup>23</sup>Then Ehud went out through the porch and shut the doors of the upper room behind him and locked them. <sup>24</sup>When he had gone out, Eglon's servants came to look, and to their surprise, the doors of the upper room were locked. So they said, "He is probably attending to his needs in the cool chamber." <sup>25</sup>So they waited till they were embarrassed, and still he had not

opened the doors of the upper room. Therefore they took the key and opened *them*. And there was their master, fallen dead on the floor. <sup>26</sup>But Ehud had escaped while they delayed, and passed beyond the stone images and escaped to Seirah. <sup>27</sup>And it happened, when he arrived, that he blew the trumpet in the mountains of Ephraim, and the children of Israel went down with him from the mountains; and he led them. <sup>28</sup>Then he said to them, "Follow *me*, for the LORD has delivered your enemies the Moabites into your hand." So they went down after him, seized the fords of the Jordan leading to Moab, and did not allow anyone to cross over. <sup>29</sup>And at that time they killed about ten thousand men of Moab, all stout men of valor; not a man escaped. <sup>30</sup>So Moab was subdued that day under the hand of Israel. And the land had rest for eighty years. <sup>31</sup>After him was Shamgar the son of Anath, who killed six hundred men of the Philistines with an ox goad; and he also delivered Israel.
