

Sermons of the Savior Matthew 5:5-7

Lesson 2

As we continue to study the Beatitudes, we find that they represent an outlook radically different from that of the world. The world praises pride, not meekness. The world places little value on righteousness and, instead, excuses sin. The world encourages a selfish lifestyle that considers self first. Jesus teaches that these worldly attitudes do not result in blessing and shows us the kind of living that brings true fulfillment and satisfaction.
