

Sermons of the Savior Matthew 6:1-8

Lesson 6

Jesus began this portion of His Sermon on the Mount with the words, *take heed*, calling those who would follow Him to beware and pay attention. There are good ways to *do charitable deeds* and *pray* and there are bad ways. There are ways to *do charitable deeds* and *pray* that will reap *rewards* and there are ways that will not. Why give and why pray if it does not touch the heart of God? Hypocrites do not ask that question. Their motive is not to touch God's heart, but to obtain *praise from men*. May we *take heed* to Jesus' warnings in these verses.

OBSERVATION: Read Matthew 6:1-8

- 1. Read through this week's verses using both your Observation Worksheet (the last page of this homework) and another Bible translation or paraphrase. After reading through these verses, what would you say to someone if they asked you what they were about?
- 2. Key words help us to better understand the verses. We have listed below key words. Mark each one in a distinctive way (either with a symbol, highlighting, or some form of boxing, circling, or underlining). Mark each of the key words each time they are used in the text.

Key Words: *charitable deed(s)/pray, seen/sees, reward, Father,* and *secret*Underline or highlight the phrases: *like/as the hypocrites/heathen* and *I say to you*

- 3. The contrasting word *but* is used two times in these verses. Mark the word as a key word. Choose one and record what is being contrasted.
- 4. The term of conclusion *therefore is* also used two times in these verses. Mark the word as a key word. Choose one and record what the conclusion was based upon.
- 5. Note and mark the word assuredly. What phrase does it precede?
 - a. Why do you think Jesus used this word?

CONSIDER THESE THINGS:

- 1. In what ways can giving be selfish?
- 2. What images or thoughts spring to mind when you think of prayer: before you were a believer
 - now that you are a believer
- 3. In what ways can prayer be displeasing to God?

CHARITABLE DEEDS: Read Matthew 6:1-4

- 1. What was Jesus' warning regarding charitable deeds?
 - a. Notice His exhortation in Matthew 5:16. What did Jesus say about good works?
 - b. Are these two instructions contradictory (Matthew 5:16, 6:1)? Why or why not?
- 2. We are not to be like the *hypocrites*. According to verse 2, why do they give to be *seen by men*?
- 3. In what ways do some organizations and churches encourage "showy" giving?
- 4. A *charitable deed* is *seen by men*. Jesus is warning that the *giver* not be *seen* or known. He is not referring to the gift. Why do we value recognition from others?
- 5. Sometimes it is difficult to give to someone in *secret*. How can we give when the person knows we are the giver, and still ensure the *glory* goes to *God*?
- 6. According to Matthew 6:3, not only are we not to *do charitable deeds before men*, we are not to dwell on it ourselves. How did Jesus explain this?
 - a. What can happen when we dwell on something good that we have done?

7.	What does Matthew 6:4 reveal about our <i>Father</i> ?		
	a. What does Psalm 139:1-3 add to the truth that our Father sees in secret?		
Н	HYPOCRITES: Read Matthew 6:1-8		
1.	The antithesis to proper giving of <i>charitable deeds</i> is found in Jesus' description of the <i>hypocrite</i> . Only once did Jesus use that word to describe someone other than the religious leaders of the time. Matthew 23 contains several of Jesus' tirades towards <i>hypocrites</i> . What actions angered Him?

	a. Notice that Jesus lumped the <i>hypocrite</i> (His name for the religious leaders) and the <i>heathen</i> (Gentiles) together. How do you think the religious leaders received this?

REWARDS: Read Matthew 6:1-5

 - b. What is often the result of praying the same words over and over?
 - c. *Vain repetitions* refer to speaking foolishly, chattering, babbling. How does this help your understanding of what Jesus tells us to avoid?
- 3. According to verse 8, why is it unnecessary to repeat the same words or use *many words*?
 - a. What do these verses reveal about this truth?

Matthew 6:1-8

¹ "Take heed that you do not do your charitable deeds before men, to be seen by them. Otherwise you have no reward from your Father in heaven. ² Therefore, when you do a charitable deed, do not sound a trumpet before you as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, that they may have glory from men. Assuredly, I say to you, they have their reward. ³ But when you do a charitable deed, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, ⁴ that your charitable deed may be in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will Himself reward you openly. ⁵ "And when you pray, you shall not be like the hypocrites. For they love to pray standing in the synagogues and on the corners of the streets, that they may be seen by men. Assuredly, I say to you, they have their reward. ⁶ But you, when you pray, go into your room, and when you have shut your door, pray to your Father who *is* in the secret *place*; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you openly. ⁷ And when you pray, do not use vain repetitions as the heathen *do*. For they think that they will be heard for their many words. ⁸ Therefore do not be like them. For your Father knows the things you have need of before you ask Him.
