

1 Thessaloníans 4:1-8

Lesson 5

The Christian life has been compared to a walk. It is never static. God has not called us to think we have arrived and attained the holiness that He calls us to seek. The moral climate in the Roman Empire was not healthy. Immorality was a way of life; and, thanks to slavery, people had the leisure time to indulge in the latest pleasures. The Christian message of holy living was new to that culture, and it was not easy for these young believers to fight the temptations around them. These verses provide four reasons why they should live a holy life and abstain from sensual lusts. May they be enough not only to call each of us away from sin, but to lives that are pleasing to the Lord who bought us.

OBSERVATION: Read 1 Thessalonians 4:1-8

- 1. Read through this week's verses using both your Observation Worksheet (the last page of this homework) and another Bible translation or paraphrase. After reading through these verses, what would you say to someone if they asked you what they are about?
